## 1. Convention Registration Open

## 3. Tsunami Debris Funding Available

The provincial government is currently accepting applications from local governments to support tsunami debris clean up activities. Applications will be accepted until March 15, 2016. This funding was made available by the Government of Japan following the Great East Japan earthquake and tsunami of March 6, 2011, which resulted in debris transiting the Pacific Ocean and depositing on North American shores. Although there is no responsibility to be borne by Japan for the impact of this devastating natural disaster, the Japanese people, through the Government of Japan graciously offered to assist British Columbians with their cleanup effort. The Government of Canada accepted those funds and has provided them to the Province of British Columbia to be administered by the Ministry of Environment.

These funds have been made available to assist coastal communities, through local

governments, First Nations and non-profit organizations with tsunami debris cleanup activities. Several agreements for cleanup activities were entered into in 2013-14 with most being extended to March 2016.
