



Watershed Security Investment Gap

BC Watershed Security Fund

\$100 million endowment = \$3-\$5M Annually

Investment Gap: \$70Million Annual

UBCM Support for Watershed Security Fund

"UBCM requests that the Province create a dedicated, sustainable, annual funding source for the Watershed Security Fund that provides \$75 million annually." Passed UBCM 2021

"UBCM requests the Province of BC build on their initial investment in the BC Watershed Security Fund to create a dedicated, sustainable, annual funding source that provides 100 million annually for community driven watershed security initiatives".

British Columbians back a **\$2 billion**Watershed Security Fund by a five-toone margin

Two-to-one majority would like to see industrial water use fees and pollution fines dedicated to the Watershed Security Fund rather than directed to government general revenue.
